Having grown up in Taiwan and Sweden as well as studied in Hong Kong for two years and now living in Copenhagen, I have experienced vastly different societies which has not only made me a learner with an exploring spirit but also taught me the importance of embracing diversity. It has developed my ambition to improve my global mindedness and reinforced my desire to help our society's pursuit for a more diverse and embracing environment. My interest in consulting developed during a full-time internship through the TechLeap program at the Boston Consulting Group Stockholm. As more firms are operating at a global scale, it is therefore essential to have a diverse staffing to contribute unique business knowledge from different parts of the world. Realizing this, I aimed to further broaden my horizon in hopes for one day being the bridge that connects the west and the east. To achieve this, I therefore decided to spend my bachelor studies in HK and Copenhagen, where I was able to explore yet another two very different learning and business environments.

In addition to building my knowledge, I actively pursued ways that can contribute to improving diversity in various areas. For example, I initiated a recruitment project at the BCG TechLeap, where visits and workshops were conducted at schools in more ethic diverse areas. The program has since then been able to recruit at least 40% non- Swedish ethnicity. Additionally, I have also been part of Copenhagen Female Leadership Academy which aims to support women in industries where females are traditionally underrepresented. Even if my personal development was limited by the opportunities that my country had to offer, this same challenge pushed me to take advantage of my education and fostered me to think outside of the box by seeking opportunities elsewhere. Indeed, in 2019, I won a scholarship to attend courses on Mathematics and International Business at Columbia University, NY. Later, in 2020 I was awarded with a highly competitive full scholarship (Bourse d'Excellence Major AEFE – Campus France) to pursue my studies in France.

More recently I've gotten the chance to dive deeper on the field that interests me the most: the applications of AI in business. First and foremost, this year I completed a research internship at École Normale Supérieure in Paris in which I worked on the implementation of learning algorithms. I received a mark of 20 out of 20 for my paper and the oral I presented at the end of it. Secondly, I'm currently developing two projects. On the one hand, I'm working as an intern within a Parisian start-up called Tripartie in which I'm building from the ground-up an AI model to solve litigations in second-hand online marketplaces. By using AI, I've built a dashboard for a Salvadorian recruiting company that significantly simplifies the process of candidate comparison. Until now, these technologies have only been accessible to the largest companies.

Furthermore, by following a multidisciplinary program I've gained a lot of breath in the courses I have followed. I expect to leverage this knowledge to think about new ways in which AI could be used in other fields. Finally, in high school I was a member of the student council, a member of the health and citizenship board and a class representative. Besides, I was part of the soccer school team for ten years. All these activities have developed my ability work within a team.

I believe that my strong academic background and professional experiences will allow me to quickly adapt to the challenges that might rise when building Al-based solutions for business. Secondly, my unique experience, after high school I decided to apply and serve in the Finnish Defense Forces, where I quickly climbed the ranks and was trained as a Reserve Officer where I later became promoted to a Second Lieutenant. Having been through this experience, has taught me the value of teamwork and friendships, but also how to be a leader and when to make tough decisions, as I ultimately was responsible for over 100 conscripts. Over one year of military service later, I was not sure whether to continue a career in the military or pursue a university education, as neither my father nor mother had been through a higher education themselves. I decided not to rush but rather have an additional sabbatical year, which turned into three. During these gap years, I worked part-time simultaneously in four very different roles and industries;1) in a restaurant with service;2) in a warehouse with logistics;3) as a caregiver in an elderly home;and 4) as a ski and snowboard instructor in Austria. I come from the countryside of Latvia – a small, Eastern-European country that for the past years has been trying to integrate the values of democratic society in its post-soviet environment. My surroundings were full of old values, stereotypes that shamed disability, various sexual orientations and stuck to outdated gender roles. I was shamed by teachers of not being good at "girly" things – music, arts and crafts, - to them it seemed rather unconventional for a woman to like maths and science. My uncle is deaf and he has never really been integrated into society. He did not go to a school, he does not work, my grandparents never put in an effort to learn sign-language. By this old-way-of-thinking, he was doomed to be the problem-child and I was criticised for not being like everyone else. I never much related to my family's and those around me way-of-thinking, but also never opposed it - that is what I was taught and that was what I believed.

My thoughts, however, switched when I started my undergraduate studies. It was a major step out of my comfort-zone. For the first time in my life I was in an international environment, communicating only in English - language foreign to me. I was taught to value different opinions, social and cultural backgrounds as well as age and religious diversity. I realised that diversity is one of the greatest assets to the human race - it allows us to adapt and survive in the forever-changing surroundings. However, diversity alone is never enough, the preliminaries that need to exist are compassion, tolerance, acceptance and inclusion. I never gave up. One important factor that helped me on this journey was to join communities, such as Latinas in Tech and Brazilians in Tech. Finding your tribe makes you aware you are not the only one. It gives you strength to continue on your path and helps you face any adversity.

When I was making my career transition, I made sure to follow my mom's wisdom and seek all the opportunities I could: I was granted a scholarship to attend the Grace Hopper Celebration 2019, the largest global conference for Women in Technology;I was granted a fellowship to take part in the Chicago Women's Leadership Accelerator program in 2021, as the first Brazilian woman to participate - I have been promoting and advocating the program since then, in hopes more Brazilian women also get the same opportunity I had;and I put my skills to work volunteering at Favela Inc., an NGO in Brazil, as a Data and CRM Analyst during 2021. I believe paying it forward is important.

I have been meeting amazing people along the way. Many of them became professional colleagues, friends, and mentors. One of my mentors once told me: "When you are trying to change the system, you will feel uncomfortable. Being the first one will always make you feel uncomfortable. But it is rewarding. Being the first one, paving the way to others, giving opportunities, and opening doors to other minorities".

I believe my background, skills, and lifelong learning mindset can bring a different perspective to the business workplace. The connections I will make in a diverse learning environment can help me grow as a professional and human being. Being granted a scholarship for GMAT can help me financially and professionally, while I invest in myself with other resources needed to study in Europe. This scholarship will make my dream to study in Europe and do a Master's in Economics come true. I want to use this opportunity to develop myself and pay it forward in the future. That will open the door for me to continue studying and specializing in the field that I chose.

Throughout my education, I have always pushed myself to integrate with different cultures and challenges that put me out of my comfort zone, into the unknown. I studied Spanish & Japanese language courses as my major for my bachelor's and successfully completed exchange study and work placements across the two countries. Furthermore, I have volunteered as a language tutor for international undergraduate students to prepare them for IELTS exams and given presentations about British culture in Tokyo and Mallorca.

The UK's increasing monolingualism rates & withdrawal of academic programmes for foreign languages means that Britain may fall behind to other economies if more linguists are not allowed to pursue these degrees.

In the future I hope to undertake an MBA outside of the UK either in the US, Asia, Germany or Spain where I can build a global network and further immerse myself in a challenging yet rewarding environment.
